Enduring Freedom... and cluster bombs

A critical look at the war on Afghanistan

You may recall all the talk about America's new "War on Terrorism" that was unloaded by our President during his State of the Union address. Bush reminds us once again that by bombing Afghanistan we offer them "liberation;" that the evil-doers "will not escape the justice of this nation."

Meanwhile, corporate media has been little more than the washing ma-

chine for Bush's dirty war, propagating their own Mickey Mouse sensationalized version of events. The television screen is an abundant source of heroic stories about America's military in Afghanistan, whereas the extensive reports about civilian causalities are conveniently left out

of the news programming.

One of the "objective" news anchors on Fox's channel 13 news recently commented that "...it looks as if the war on terror is the savior of the Afghan people..." But is the United States' war in Afghanistan as clean and sparkling as is

reported, or are they spouting crass empty rhetoric?

The White House press team is constantly reminding us that the only targets are "military facilities." For an air war that explicitly targets military installations, the war in Afghanistan has had an absurd number of civilian casualties. In the first eight and a half weeks of the war alone, 3,767 confirmed civilians had died as a direct result of the bombing, the population equivalent of eleven



World Trade Center attacks. Keep in mind that independent human rights observers have asserted that the majority of the casualties have not been counted. The bombing cam-

paign has severely afflicted the civilian infrastructure. Some of the early civilian targets include a dam power station in Kajaki, a telephone exchange in Kabul, the Kabul media office of Al Jazeera (an applauded Middle East television station), and truckloads of refugees attempting to leave the area.
